AGENT WILKINS: 19th March 2020, 14:03 at Shrewsbury police department's office. I'm agent Wilkins Adam, taking the testimony of Molly Hale in the case $n^9A56-83D1$, death of Vincent Jager. This interview is going to be recorded, are you okay with it?

MOLLY HALE: Yes.

AGENT WILKINS: Let's start about the day before Vincent Jager was found dead. Tell me about your timeline during the 18th March 2020 please.

HALE: Okay... Hum... Sorry I'm a little bit nervous about the situation. The 18th March 2020 was a Wednesday wasn't it? I woke up at 7:00 am, because my work started at 9:00 am. I went the house at 8:30am approximately, and nobody was around in the neighbourhood, it's very calm there. So I went to work.

AGENT WILKINS: Where is your work place situated ?

HALE: I work as medical secretary, in the doctor's office of the city center.

AGENT WILKINS: Okay fine. What happened next?

HALE: I finished at 17:00, as usual, and I came home at, around 17:45. The traffic is horrible at this time and I parked the car, and went down the parking. And usually, Mr. Jager is in his front yard, but he wasn't there. He liked to take care of his vegetable garden. Then, I opened my door to take off my stuff and join my children and husband, and we spent time together all the evening.

AGENT WILKINS: Okay thank you. You are the one who called the police in order to report the death of Mr.Jager right?

HALE: That is correct.

WILKING: Can you please, tell me the circumstances of this discovery?

HALE: As I said, the day before I found him ... dead, I didn't see him in his garden. So, I decided to go look for him at his house, to see what's going on, if everything was okay with him.

AGENT WILKINS: At what time was it?

HALE: Around 8:00 am.

AGENT WILKINS: Go on please.

HALE: I knocked at his door but nobody was answering, so I got worried. I chose to go in his backyard to see if his back door was open and it was. So I called his name, but it seemed like nobody was there. I walked in his house and I found him... Near the stairs. I immediately called the police.

AGENT WILKINS: Thank you for your statement. Did Mr.Jager had any enemies? Or some people that didn't like him?

HALE: Absolutely not. He was very respected, especially because he was a really good doctor when he was still working. He is really nice with everybody, very sociable. But I noticed something strange the day before he died

AGENT WILKINS: Would you please, tell me more about it?

HALE: I was preparing dinner with my husband. And my son came to us, to tell us that our cat went out the house. So, I decided to go outside to find it. He was under our car, so it wasn't difficult to find him. But I saw Mr. Jager and his doctor, Mr. Webber, having an argument. It was a violent argument, because Mr. Jager chased Mr Webber out of his house.

AGENT WILKINS: Did you hear what they were talking about?

HALE: Not at all. I just saw Mr... go to his car and leave the neighbourhood.

AGENT WILKINS: Did you see Mr Webber later in the day, or during the night?

HALE: No sir.

AGENT WILKINS: And did you notice something else?

HALE: Not at all.

AGENT WILKINS: I'm going to end the interview. Thank you for your honesty and if something else comes to your mind, don't hesitate to call us.

AGENT WILKINS: 20th March 2020, 17:32 at Shrewsbury police department's office. I'm agent WILKINS Adam, taking the testimony of Carla Jager in the case $n^9A56-83D1$, death of Vincent Jager. This interview is going to be recorded, are you okay with it?

Carla Jager: Yes.

AGENT WILKINS: Perfect, let's start by talking about the relationship you have with your father.

Carla Jager: After my mother's death, I ended all contact with my dad I haven't seen him since.

AGENT WILKINS: How much time has it been? Since you talked to him?

Carla Jager: Exactly 25 years tomorrow.

AGENT WILKINS: Pardon me to be so direct with the questions but why have you cut contact with him?

Carla Jager: Simply because it was only my mother that mattered to me. She was always there for me. Unlike my father who was never at home because of his work. Besides, when he was at home, he only yelled at me, he was never satisfied with what I was doing. He was too demanding of me. There has never been a moment of sharing between us. That's why I decided to live my life on my side.

AGENT WILKINS: Do you feel hate towards him.

Carla Jager: No of course not, he is still the man that made me who I am today. As time passes and as you get more mature, you tend to understand more and more about the decisions that people make, I knew I could forgive him only some time ago. He had to work for us the family, hence why he wasn't present that often with us. He wanted me to be spectacular, as every parents want their child to be, and so I felt way too much pressure from him. Now I would have liked to thank him for what he's done for me. I am so sorry for what i've done... I... I'm so sorry dad...

A quick break from the conversation to let the emotions of Carla Jager stabilize.

AGENT WILKINS: So let's get back to where we left off, do you know if your father had any enemies?

Carla Jager: Not to my knowledge. Except that the neighbor was not satisfied with her accommodation. So she wanted to take over my dad's house, which had easier access and a magnificent terrace that she didn't have. She spent all of her spare time coming to see my father after my mother died. Surely it must have continued even more so after my departure.

AGENT WILKINS: Alright, do you know his neighbor?

Carla Jager: Not really no, she came to our house when I wasn't home. Once in a while i would say "Hi" if we ever saw each other but that's it, I don't know why she liked my father's company that much.

AGENT WILKINS: Ok thank you, can we please talk more about your father?

Carla Jager: Yes absolutely, that's why we're here.

AGENT WILKINS: That's correct. Was your father depressed or suicidal?

Carla Jager: My father experienced my mother's death very badly. They were very close. Before I stopped seeing him, he kept asking me "Why? Why so early ?". After that he started to feel better, his morale improved and then I left. So I don't know how he has behaved for the past 25 years, but losing his wife and then his daughter must have been a terrible shock to him.

AGENT WILKINS: Was your father taking medicine?

Carla Jager: I think yes, he did. However, I cannot explain why. He never told me about his medical issues. He was very proud and if I had to guess, didn't want to bother us with his illness. His doctor did come to his house often.

AGENT WILKINS: Do you know, who his doctor is ?

Carla Jager: I think his name was ... Dr. Webber?

AGENT WILKINS: Okay. Was your father taking drugs, or any similar substances?

Carla Jager: Not to my knowledge. Only medicines.

AGENT WILKINS: Alright, Thank you for your time and your collaboration. We will give you some news about the case and return to you if we need any more of your help.

AGENT WILKINS: 24th March 2020, 16:42 at Shrewsbury police department's office. I'm Lieutenant WILKINS Adam, taking the testimony of WEBBER, Samuel in the case n°9A56-83D1, death of JÄGER, Vincent. This interview is going to be recorded, are you okay with it?

SAMUEL WEBBER: It isn't a problem, really, it is needed.

AGENT WILKINS: It is mandatory actually. So, would you please tell us who you are ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: My name is WEBBER. I am a Doctor which works from his cabinet in Shrewsbury. I am 59 years old.

AGENT WILKINS: Who was Vincent Jäger to you ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: Vincent was a patient for some time now, a couple of years. I've known him for more than 30 years, just when I got to install my cabinet. It's been so long, god I'm old.

AGENT WILKINS: Was Mr.Jäger only a patient to you ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: Ohh not at all ! We saw each other regularly. At first only for medical reasons, but as time passed and the number of our encounters grew, we begin to have this relationship, that I can't really describe but I became more than just his doctor, I became his friend. He's been at my table more times than I can count and he started to become acquainted with my family.

AGENT WILKINS: Mr. Jäger's neighbor has reported that you were present in his house the day before he died, could you comment on that statement.

SAMUEL WEBBER: Yes absolutely, I usually come once a week to see how Vincent was doing, if he felt alright. I didn't want him to have a relapse.

AGENT WILKINS: This same neighbor said they heard a dispute between you and Mr.Jäger, what exactly happened ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: humm, let me remember it a bit…(pause), I'm sorry I can't remember in details our exchange. We talked for a bit, we didn't agree on the subject but I didn't think it was an argument. We were just debating in my eyes.

AGENT WILKINS: And what was the subject ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: Nothing important, like what is the best food one can eat. (pause)

AGENT WILKINS: Are you informed on the cause of death of Mr.Jäger ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: Yes, He fell down the stairs !? I knew I should have installed a stairlift. At his age it should have been an essential addition to his household .

AGENT WILKINS: We have also found a syringe on the crime scene, it contained concentrated morphine, did you have any knowledge about this ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: No ! I mean ... Yes but I never prescribed it to him.

AGENT WILKINS: Was this the subject of your debate ?

SAMUEL WEBBER: ... Yes it was. (pause). I discovered that he took morphine to weaken the pain he felt because of his sickness treatment and he tried to use it to escape from his dark thoughts and the depression he suffered. His life got much much harder for him after he lost his wife and daughter...

After analyzing and relating all the elements that we had thanks to the clues found and the evidences gathered, it was concluded that the victim died due to falling down his stairs. This fall was due to a loss of balance caused by the improper and dangerous intake of morphine.

Mr. Jäger was going through a painful period of depression which led him to take drugs.

His doctor, Dr.Webber, didn't mention his uses of morphine in the medical book.

The daughter of Mr. Jägger has decided to prosecute Mr. WEBBER for failure to assist a person in danger. I, Lieutenant Wilkins Adam, has made available all the elements of my investigation to the tribunal.
